
The 2025 Tenarky District Rose Show – "Jewels of the South"

Consulting Rosarian Corner by Cindy Worch, District CR Chair

Well, I'm sure all of us have been trying our hardest to stay cool. Even with the heat I've had a very wet spring and now into the summer. We received over 4 inches in June and over 3 inches the month of July.

Over July 4th weekend, I did a tremendous amount of deadheading/pruning with some generic pruners that I had. I also do a lot of work on the computer at work. So, my carpal tunnel flared up. After 10 days of steroids and a brace, I'm finally recovering.

Looking back, I was thinking about the pruners I was using. Years ago, I had a pair of ergonomic Felco F 15 pruners for small hands and a twisting handle which is larger than the other one. I loved those pruners and never had hand fatigue with them. I imagine they are buried somewhere in our old Manchester garden. Has anyone else lost garden tools in the garden and was never able to find them?

So, I ordered a new pair of Felco's. They weren't cheap. Mine were \$75.00 on Amazon, but I felt that was cheaper than hand surgery! I deadheaded several roses yesterday and felt no problems. Below are part numbers on the Felco ergonomic ones if you want to investigate some of your own. If you are experiencing hand fatigue these are life (hand) savers.

- F15 Small Right Hand
- F12 Medium Right Hand
- F17 Medium Left Hand
- F7 Large Right Hand
- F10 Large Left Hand

I hope this helps someone as much as it helped me.

Arranger's Corner by Paula Williams, ARS Judge

The design I'm featuring for this issue is one of my favorites and some of you may have seen a few of the "stretch" designs I have done in Facebook posts, but I wanted to review this type again. Stretch refers to a design using two containers and they are assembled with a connective branch or line material to give the impression of being one arrangement. When and if they are pulled apart, they can stand alone as one design. I looked up several examples of mine in the past and also one with 'Miss Paula' I just created in November 2024 when we were blessed with so many nice days to cut roses.

Arrangement 1 is with 'Bees Knees', number 2 is 'TY', number 3 is with 'Miss Paula', and it shows the 2 separated, number 4 is same but linked together to form the "stretch" effect. Check out the tiny black mark on picture 4 to show the two materials attached. The fun thing is you don't need many roses if containers don't overwhelm your blooms.
